## Public Health Situation Alert – Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza and Chicken Flocks

Highly Pathogenetic Avian Influenza A (H5N1) has been circulating in birds in the United States for years. Recently it has also been found in many common mammals, including humans who have had direct contact with infected animals such as cows, cats, horses, dogs, and others. Until now most human infections were mild and could be traced to interactions with cows. Now there is evidence that H5N1 has mutated and at least one human has died following sickness via direct contact with his infected chickens. Anyone keeping chickens or cows should always practice good hygiene when around sick animals, including wearing a mask, eye protection washing hands and disinfecting boots. Never bring a sick animal into your house. Raw cows' milk has been shown to contain live H5N1 virus though not proven to cause infection. Raw milk consumption should be avoided by everyone as the risks far outweigh any perceived benefits. Pasteurization has been shown to kill H5N1 as well as numerous other viruses and bacteria that may cause illness.
